Lucy Carner Gives Interesting Talk at Y.W.C.A. Tuesday

Eighty-four fathers and mothers assembled at the Y.W.C.A. on Tuesday evening for the annual Fathers' and Mothers' banquet when the Mothers' club invited their husbands to come and see their club.

Miss Carner's talk was interesting to the mothers because it told some of the significant purposes back of this national organization of which the local Mothers' club is a part; and it also explained to the fathers just what their wives were helping stand for by their membership in the Y.

"The more I meet with other organizations the more I see that we all learn from each other—that we have a common denominator that makes us all alike in many of the things we want. . . . Government is influencing the lives of all of us more today than ever before; whether that is a good or bad influence depends on our attitude toward it and whether we are the kind of citizens who bring our own best standards into this thing of which we are a part.

"The Y out-reaches not only into local and national, but also into a World meeting I attended in Budapest I was surprised how much at home I felt because so many of the women from other countries were

wanting just what I wanted. A negro working girl friend of mine who went as delegate from the United States to one of these world meetings said she felt at home as soon as she heard a Chinese factory worker talk and saw how much alike their problems were.

"Among the things that matter in the Y.W.C.A. outside of this working with other people is this spirit of fellowship within our own association which we hear so much about. That spirit of fellowship makes home women as well as business girls feel concern over such things as the eight hour bill to protect women industrial workers.

"Then a thing that matters is that we can all be proud that a movement of women can grow to such an extent in this country when European nations are closing doors to many activities of women citizens."

Mrs. T. L. Osborn, president of the Y asked the blessing and Mrs. E. E. Paulsen, president of the club, presided at the speakers' table with other club officers.

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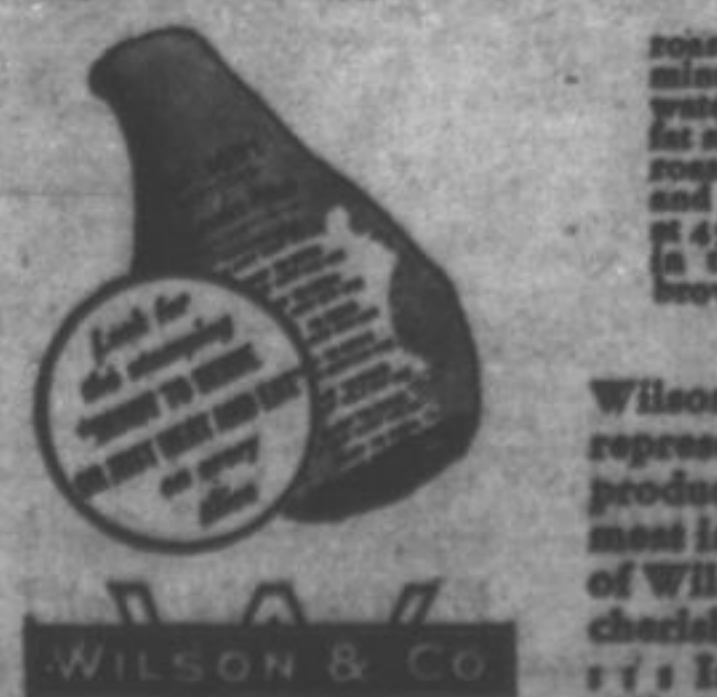


Tender Made Baked Ham Place one Wilson's Secret Processed Tender Made Ham in side up in baking pan. Place in oven preheated to 350° Fahrenheit. Heat seven minutes to the pound, score the fat, top with a mixture of 1/4 cup light brown sugar together with 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard. Dot with cloves. Roast in oven and heat about fifteen minutes longer. Serve at once.

A New Method of Heating and Baking Tender Made Ham in Tin Fill a roaster (or any other pan) half full of boiling water, and place in it the roasting tin. Put cover on roaster and steam in hot oven (400°) for 45 minutes. Remove ham from tin. Pour away water from roaster or pan, and put both ham, fat side up, and bones from tin, back into the roaster. Score fat, cover with brown sugar and return uncovered to oven for 15 minutes at 450°. It is suggested that you tie the legs to the roaster for heating the ham while broiling.

We Suggest This Recipe Place a whole Wilson's Tender Made Ham in roaster, fat side up, add one cup of water. Bake 15 minutes to pound in oven 350°. Take ham from oven, score fat repeatedly with cloves. Return to hot oven, about 450° for 15 minutes. Allow three minutes per pound longer for Salt Ham.
