Over two hundred Highland Park and Ravinia residents attended the Hobby Show sponsored by the Arts committee of the Ravinia Woman's club on Sunday, and spent a pleasant hour or two inspecting the interesting exhibits. In one corner was the outstanding exhibit of the Adult Education groups, which included drawings, wood work, copper, pewter, pottery, and articles of sewing. Mrs. Leslie Schaffler, director, some of the class teachers, and Mr. "X" were present to explain the processes, and many visitors expressed their eagerness to attend one or more of the Adult Education classes next year.

Both children and grownups were attracted to the Children's Corner, where Martha and Shirley Baumgartner exhibit their collection of dolls, Kirk Fischer, his array of maps of this hemisphere, Harold Schimmelfeng, his airplane models, model of the Queen Mary, books on airplanes and ships, Paula Raff, aided by Betty Ann Wible, her collection of toy animals and her mother's collection of spoons from all over the world, Bill Roush his transportation exhibit of vehicles from the ox-cart to the modern airplane, Arthur Dubin books and other material about trains, Kitty Schaffler some lovely original paintings, and Donald Gault a superb airplane model of Wiley Post's "Winnie May" and a model of the Queen Mary, and Mrs. Schimmelfeng's exhibit of doll clothes of thirty years ago.

Other exhibitors were Mr. and Mrs. Sherman Clough, the former showing ash trays from many European countries, and the latter interesting milk glass and a "Westward Ho" piece, Mr. Robert Landauer, a splendid collection of fossils, Mr. Edmund Andrews an absorbing exhibit of Americana from 1746 to 1900, unusual portraits by Mr. Frank Selfridge, a lovely photographic scene by Robert Landauer, the interesting scrap book of the past 25 years of the club compiled by Mrs. John Warmington, delightful old school book by Mr. Godfrey Eyer, charming spatter work pictures, original greeting cards and note book covers by Mrs. Rasmusen, fascinating glass paper weights from France, England and New England by Mrs. Alfred Burdick, a fine pottery exhibit by Mrs. O. Lawrence Olesen and by her teacher, Mrs. Elery Harvey, who showed the clay in every stage of development up to the finished product, an embroidered table cover made by an Austrian high school girl, Miss Katrina, an

interesting collection of chess sets, from the pocket set to sets of huge chess men, by Mrs. Jacob Hoffman, and a peg train chess set by Mrs. Ray Smith, the excellent work of "Monie" Eyer, one of the pupils in Mrs. William Savin's art class, the interesting paintings of Mr. Savin and the delightful sketches of Mrs. Savin's, and the attractive posters shown by Mrs. Everett Fontaine, made by pupils in the W.P.A. poster class, at the Y.W.C.A., taught by Nicholas Frigo.

Aided by Helen Sarett, Paula Raff won the prize offered by Mr. Hoffman to the person completing a check-mate, with the chessmen especially arranged, in two moves. At 4:45 the Flute Quartet from the local Civic orchestra which has been coached by Mrs. Helen Mayer Mannings, played a few charming selections.
