Alec Templeton In Concert Here May 14



Alec Templeton, talented blind planist, will be presented in a concert at the Jesse Lowe Smith Auditorium on the evening of May 14, at 8:15 o'clock, under the auspices of the Elm Place P. T. A.

Acclaimed a "true genius" both in England and America, Mr. Templeton was born of Scottish parents, on a farm near Cardiff in Wales. At the age of 2, he played the plane, imitating the notes of a near-by church bell. At four, he composed a lullaby with which his mother sang him to sleep. At five, he directed a choir of his playmates, and when Alec was twelve, his father sold his interest in the farm, moved to London and enrolled his son in the Royal Academy. During that year he won the British Broadcasting company prize for composition and at the age of 17, was awarded the Royal Academy of Music L.R.A.M. It was during this same Fiocchi and Jesse Helton, aldermen year that he won a contest over a field of 8,000 from the entire United Kingdom, which was sponsored by the London Daily Express. During the following years he appeared in numerous recitals and orchestra appearances throughout England. Alec's American triumph came when he arrived in America with Jack Hylton, famous British bandmaster.
