

### ANNUAL SCHOLARSHIP TO BE AWARDED IN BOYS CLUB ASSEMBLY

In order that two deserving high school senior boys may continue their education, two scholarships of \$50 each will be awarded by the Boys' club. The seniors, who will be selected by Messrs. Mason, Slocum, Einbecker and Wolters, will be announced in the next Boys' club assembly.

The need of aid and the service rendered the school during the past four years will be the principal considerations of the committee in making the awards.

Applications should be submitted in writing to Mr. Einbecker, the Boys club adviser, before Friday, May 7.

The application should contain the name of the boy, the institution to be attended, and the use to which the money will be put if the award is received.

Several thousand invitations have been issued, and this celebration is to be one of the outstanding affairs of the Junior B'nai B'rith of this year.

Elaborate plans are being made by the Boy Scout groups of A.Z.A., the mothers' auxiliaries of Junior B'nai B'rith, and the men's Bar Mitzvah committee of B'nai B'rith.

The singers will be four soloists and a chorus of fifty representing all local churches. There is no admission charge. Everyone is urged to come in order that the singers who are giving generously of their time so that Highland Park can have an all community song offering may feel that their work is appreciated.

The solos will be sung by Mrs. Fred Okey, soprano; Mary Ann Macfaden (Mrs. R. K.) contralto; Joseph Redine, bass; and Thomas Thompson, soloist with the Highland Park Episcopal church, tenor. The chorus, which has been meeting every week at the Y.W.C.A., is directed by Russell Neilson, soloist with the First Methodist church of Wilmette, formerly with the Chicago Little Opera company and director of the Harmony Club of Swedish Male Chorus. The accompaniments will be by Miss Irene Taylor, regular accompanist for the chorus, at the piano, and Mrs. Esther Ward Ball at the organ.

The first part of the oratorio sets forth the desire for a higher life beyond mortal suffering and the Biblical words "My soul is athirst for God, my tears have been my meat day and night." The second part gives the answer or reaffirmation of the glories of the Holy City. In this are employed the well-known words "Eye hath not seen, ear hath not heard neither have entered into the heart of man

the things which God hath prepared for them that love Him." The comfort and sublimity of many passages of scripture will be recognized during the solos and choruses. Especial attention is called to the change in date from May 9 as announced in last week's papers to May 16, Sunday evening, at the Presbyterian church.
