The little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. V. T. Mertz of Meadowbrook Lane is ill with scarlet fever in the Evanston Contagion hospital.

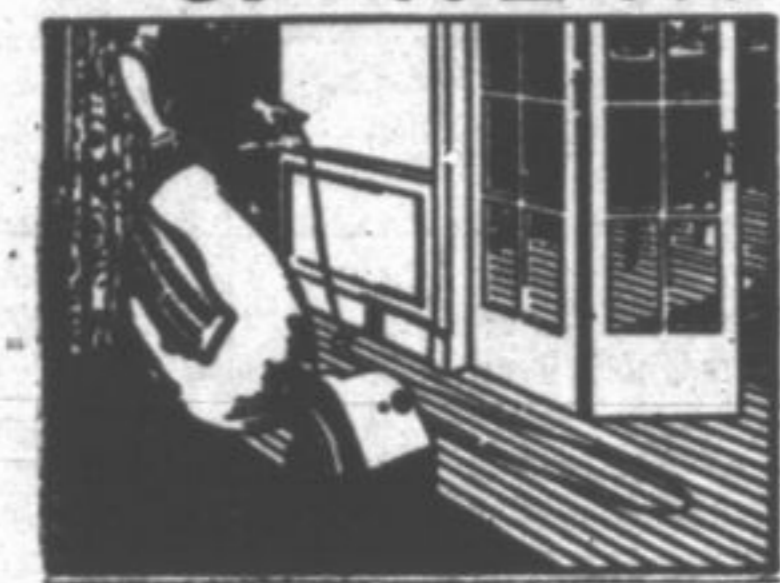
