### Governor Horner Designates May 17-23 As Air Mail Week

Governor Henry Horner has designated the week of May 17 to 23 as Air Mail Week for Illinois. The purpose is to arouse greater interest on the part of the public in the use of air mail through various means of publicity in co-operation with post offices all over the country. Each post office will promote air mail during this week in some novel and striking way.

The Highland Park post office announces that on Monday, May 17, weather permitting, one of the employees of the office, Mr. Joseph P. Ugolini, who holds a transport pilot's license, will fly over Highland Park, dropping a printed message urging everyone in our city to mail at least one letter air mail during this Air Mail Week starting May 17. These leaflets will contain the latest air mail schedules as worked out from Highland Park to principal cities.

As an additional incentive for everyone to become acquainted with the speed and other advantages of mailing their letters air mail and urging their friends to correspond

with them by air mail, Postmaster Cobb of Highland Park offers a prize to the one who reports the best time of an air mail letter from Highland Park to any city on the Atlantic coast and return, another for the best time from here to any town on the Gulf coast and return and a third to the one who reports the best time between Highland Park to a city on the Pacific coast and return.

To win, the letter must be mailed air mail from Highland Park during Air Mail Week—May 17 to 23, as shown by post mark on envelope; the return letter must also be mailed air mail during this same week from some city on the Atlantic, Gulf or Pacific coast, as indicated by post mark, the return letter (from friend, relative, business firm or other correspondent) to contain the envelope of the letter to which it is an answer. The use of Special Delivery Air Mail either or both ways is permissible. "Best time" will be figured from the hour on the post-mark of letter mailed from Highland Park to the exact time the patron brings the return air mail letter to the stamp window at the Highland Park post office.

Award of prizes will be announced in this paper the week fol-

lowing. Special posters on display at the post office will remind you that it is Air Mail Week; but you are asked to watch for the airplane and shower of air mail schedules.

### Wilber Brotherton Passes Away May 9

Notice has just been received of the death of Wilber Brotherton, Jr., husband of Dorothy Bastin Brotherton, formerly of this city. Mrs. Brotherton is a daughter of the late Abbie D. Bastin, who taught for over thirty years in the Highland Park schools.

Mr. Brotherton died Sunday, May 9, at the hospital in Ellensburg, Washington, following an operation for the removal of his gall bladder. Early Highland Parkers will remember that Mr. and Mrs. Brotherton were married here in 1916 in the old Bastin home at the corner of Lincoln and St. Johns avenues—now the Robert Clark residence.

During the first years of their married life the Brothertons lived in Michigan, but of recent years they have been in the far west. Mr. Brotherton, who was a specialist in plant pathology and genetics, and had developed a disease-resisting

pea, was in the seed business in Ellensburg—"Brotherton Seeds, Inc." Those who met him during his many visits to Highland Park will remember him as a man of unusual force and intellectual power, but withal, lovable and unassuming. He was a devoted husband and father.

It is a commentary on his relation to the men he worked with that everyone of them offered his own blood for the several transfusions made in the last frantic effort to save the sick man's life.

Also his unquenchable humor came to the surface in the most desperate moments of his illness. When he was roused enough to realize he was having a transfusion, he said: "I hope the blood you're giving me is a bit of Scotch and fighting Irish mixed."

Mr. Brotherton is survived by his wife and four children: Wilber Brotherton, III, age 20; Harley Bartlett Brotherton, age 18; Rowena Bastin Brotherton, age 13; and Dorothy Bastin Brotherton, age 10.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 1 p. m. at Ellensburg with Bishop Hustin of Seattle, Mr. Brotherton's brother-in-law, officiating.
