Cheese Cake

1/2 cup shortening 1/2 cup sugar

2 eggs 1/4 teas, baking powder.

2 cups flour. Cream butter. Add sugar, eggs, cheese mixture. Add the tomatoes flour and baking powder. Roll dough out to fit pan. Place in heat through and serve on toast. oiled pan, turning dough up to make a high rim. Pour filling over dough and put melted butter over top of filling. Bake at 425 degrees for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 235 degrees F., and continue baking another 20 minutes.
