Side Lights on the Bombing
An airplane passing over Deerfield simultaneously with the explosion of a bomb at the C. C. Kapschull house just after mid-night and early Saturday morning gave people an idea of war in Spain. Houses a mile from the Kapschull home on Spruce street were violently shaken. Four miles east, at the Carl Anderson Super-Service station on North St. John's avenue in Highland Park, the door of the office opened from the blast. The Elmer Clavey house across from Kapschull's had six windows on the west side of the house shattered; basement windows blown in and ga-

rage windows broken. A chandelier hanging over the bed in which Mrs. Clavey was sleeping dropped prisms down on her. The home of Harry E. Wing had plaster knocked off, the living room curtains blown to the floor and garage and basement windows broken. Across the river on Division street the Harry Frost home had windows broken, too. Fifteen minutes after the blast the streets were swarming with cars and people in all descriptions of night clothes. State highway snow fences were used to close off the Kapschull house and lawn from curiosity seekers, and the window openings were hastily closed with building paper. The account of the bombing appears elsewhere in the paper.
