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FUN - BUT NOT LAWLESSNESS

When boyish exuberance oversteps the bounds of playfulness and results in destruction of property, it ceases to be innocent and enters the realm of lawlessness.

Recent occurrences bring to light the fact that there exists among the boys of Highland Park a disregard for the property of others, a disrespect for the law and for the rights of others that is not wholesome or encouraging.

A specific instance will illustrate. A year ago last Halloween, some Highland Park boys, all students of Deerfield-Shields High School, tore down a large section of the fence in front of the house of a citizen of this city.

About a month ago the home of this same citizen was again molested, this time two hand carvings on the gate posts, fastened on with seven-inch screws, being broken off.

To what do these incidents point? Certainly, as said above, to a lack of respect for property rights on the part of the boys.

The tendency today is to turn children over to schools, camps, and colleges for training not only in academic subjects, but in citizenship, ethics, religion, and moral conduct.

Parents, from a sense of pressure of other things, laziness, or for any other reason, should not shirk this responsibility. They should begin now to curb any tendency toward malicious lawlessness in their children.

Local Bankers To Attend Convention In Chicago May 24-25

J. M. Appel, president, and other officers of the Highland Park State Bank, are expected to attend the forty-seventh annual convention of the Illinois Bankers Association in the Palmer House, Chicago, May 24-25.

Nearly 1,000 officers of the 815 member banks attending the convention will act upon committee reports dealing with vital legislative and economic problems.

Among the principal convention speakers will be Dr. Raymond Moley, editor of News-Week and former Roosevelt adviser; J. F. T. O'Connor, comptroller of the currency; Stewart McDonald, administrator of the Federal Housing Administration; Orval W. Adams, Salt Lake City, first vice president of the American Bankers association; J. Harvie Wilkinson, Richmond, Va., banker, and Louis Ruthenburg, president of Servel, Inc., Evansville, Ind.

Dr. Moley's subject will be "Where Do We Go From Here?" and Mr. McDonald will speak in "Homes - Speculation or Investment?" "Industrial Peace Is a Community Problem" is the thesis upon which Mr. Ruthenburg will base his discussion of present day labor relations problems.
