**Catholic Youth Federation Names Conference Members**

Comparable to the Senate, delegates and representatives from the various Catholic Young Peoples clubs in Lake county will sit in assembly at the Second Annual Conference which is to be held on Sunday afternoon, May 23, at Holy Child high school.

Mr. John Hubley of St. Mary's parish, Lake Forest, has been named executive chairman. He will be ably assisted by Mr. John Durkin, as conference chairman, whose duty it will be to control all discussion from the floor. Miss Mary Rita Vogel of St. Anastasia's parish, Waukegan, is conference secretary.

Janet McCaffrey of Highwood and Catherine Hubley of Lake Forest will head the reception committee. William Gallagher of St. Anne's parish, Barrington, will be in charge of registration. Charles Cermak of St. Peter's parish, Antioch, and Vivion Salmon of Immaculate Conception parish, Waukegan, will be in charge of conference publicity. Joseph Fincutter of St. Anastasia's parish and Edward Steffans of St. James' parish, Highwood, head the house committee. Charles Neal of Holy Family church, North Chicago, is in charge of invitations.

The Lake County Catholic Federation committee have divided their work into two phases: Catholic action which is chairmaned by Vernon Meintzer of Holy Cross parish, Deerfield; and social action which is chairmaned by Mary Rita Vogel of St. Anastasia parish, Waukegan.

Under Catholic action falls the establishment of Young Peoples clubs in parishes where none as yet exist and the help and encouragement of already existing groups by way of interchange of schedules, programs, methods of government, solution of mutual difficulties and the creation of a morale among the various clubs based on the fact that

they are a distinctive group, capable of functioning to the benefit of their respective parishes and to the strengthening of a Catholic spirit in Lake county.

Under Social Action the following program has been planned: A Spiritual Retreat to take place on a Sunday during the Fall of the year. A Federation Banquet at Glen Flora Country Club and it was at this time the majority of the people had learned about the Federation idea and the work that had been accomplished thus far toward Federation. And in May the Annual Conference which aims to be intellectual along Catholic Action lines.
