Camp Starts Four Weeks From Saturday

The first of the three periods at Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan starts on June 29th, just four short weeks from this coming Saturday. Registrations are coming in every day at Scout headquarters in Highland Park, and Scouts planning to go to camp are urged to get the application filled out soon and mail to the Scout office. Troops planning to go as units will have first choice on the camp-sites and all boys of the troops will be together at camp. As often as possible, Scouts from the same towns stay together and always Scouts live in the same villages as the Scouts from his own troop.

The two other periods will run concurrently each for two weeks and the camp will be over on August 6. For further information see your Scoutmaster or write or call the Scout office in Highland Park for a camp folder.

The North Shore Area Council contingent to the National Jamboree will travel via the New York Central railroad to New York before going to Washington via the Baltimore & Ohio. The itinerary takes the group to Niagara Falls, then to New York. An overnight stop-over at New York will give them an opportunity to visit Radio City, Grant's tomb, Riverside drive, the George Washington bridge, the bright lights of Broadway, the Battery, the Lower East side, and other interesting sights in New York that to most of them are nothing more than names. The group will leave New York on the Baltimore & Ohio and go to Philadelphia where they will see a number of historically important places before they continue on the way to Washington and the Jamboree. This trip has been worked out with the railroads so that the trip will not cost any more than the previously announced rate for the Jamboree with the group going direct to Washington.

The Jamboree Scouts will arrive from Washington at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 10, the same day as the Scouts leave for the second period at Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan so that those who are going to camp can leave that same afternoon on the Flambeau with the other Scouts.

A. This hospital has a capacity of 6,300 beds, 27 wards, 14 detached dining rooms and a central recrea-

tion hall seating 2,000 persons.

Q. When were degrees first given to graduates of the University of Illinois?

A. The class of 1878 was the first class to receive degrees. Illinois was the only state college that refused to give degrees up to that time.

Q. Who was John McCracken Robinson?

A. John McCracken Robinson was a United States Senator from Illinois in 1832 and judge of the Illinois State Supreme Court in 1843.
