This week city delivery from the Highland Park post office was extended to include the whole of the Skokie Valley situated within the city limits of Highland Park, from Deerfield road south to County Line

Delivery will be one-trip daily by truck, south on South Ridge road from Deenfield road to County Line road, east to the Village of the Woods and return north on Skokie boulevard.

House delivery will be made to those living on Old Briar road, Westview, Eastview and Ridgelee paved streets with all city improvements in. To others living in this section, curb delivery will be made where suitable boxes are erected at designated points along the line of travel.

Local Hospital **Becomes Member** Hospital Care Plan

The Highland Park hospital became the 55th member hospital in the Plan for Hospital Care, it was announced today by Perry Addleman, executive director. There are 54 other member hospitals in Chicago and surrounding territory. Other nearby hospitals are St. Therese in Waukegan and St. Francis in Evanston.

The Plan has been in operation since January 1 and now has 13,500

profit program, directed by outstanding persons and operating under the supervision of the department of Public Welfare and the Department of Insurance of the State of Illinois.

Addition of Highland Park hospital to the Plan means that its 55 beds and all of its modern equipment becomes available to employed persons of the Highland Park community and its dependents for a small monthly fee. The Plan provides 21 days of hospital care to gainfully employed persons for \$9.60 a year. Subscribers receive semiprivate accommodations which means 2 to 4 beds in a room.

They also receive use of the operating room, general nursing service, anesthesia, ordinary drugs, medications, dressings, pathological and laboratory services and x-ray services when considered necessary

The 21 days of hospital care may be used in one or several admissions. Provision is made for dependents scriber pays \$4.50 for which half the

The object of the Plan is to provide all the necessary routine care that an acutely ill patient requires. Subscribers desiring private rooms of special nursing pay the additional cost themselves." The Plan does not provide any medical services and does not in any way interfere with the relationship between physician and patient.

"A subscriber," Mr. Addleman said, "has free choice of any member hospital. Hospitals in the area surrounding Chicago are being admitted into the Plan in order that residents of suburban communities may use the hospital nearest their home if they prefer to.
