#### **Motorists Beware! Accidents Increase During Vacation**

The joyful cry of "school's out" heralding the summer vacation period, may bring happiness to the hearts of Illinois' million and a half school children, but to the motorists and parents it means added responsibility, Secretary of State Edward J. Hughes declared in a safety bulletin issued here today.

"Temporarily relieved from the duty of acquiring an education, a major portion of this veritable army of youngsters will play in streets and roam the highways in search of pleasure, thus placing added responsibility on the shoulders of the motorists," Secretary Hughes pointed out.

"Careful drivers will bear in mind that even if not playing directly in streets, children will be darting back and forth over roadways at all hours of the day."

Mr. Hughes said that throughout the nation last year a total of 1,410 children were killed and more than 41,500 were injured while playing in streets.

"The appalling number of innocent children killed or maimed each

duced!" Secretary Hughes declared. "When it comes to protecting the lives of our little ones," continued Secretary Hughes, "there can be no compromise or evasion of this duty on the part of either parents or motorists.

"Parents, older brothers and sisters are morally obligated to cooperate with the motorist by forbidding children to play in streets and by urging them to use the utmost caution while crossing roadways. Smaller children should be instructed as to the proper method in crossing streets."

#### "Hiawatha," Speed Train Is Financial **Success to Owners**

A financial success at the tender age of two.

That's the enviable record achieved by the Hiawatha, streamlined speed train that will be two years in service Saturday (May 29) for every time it passes a mile post on its speedy run between Chicago-Milwaukee and St. Paul-Minneapolis it nets its owners, the Milwaukee road, \$2.49 and posts are passed every minute.

Probably the only individual train operation for which earning figures are made public, it was announced in a statement commemorating the Hiawatha's anniversary that during its two years operation it carried more than 550,000 paying passengers and its gross revenues exceeded \$2,600,000.

During 1936 gross earnings of the Hiawatha, and overflow sections operated frequently, amounted to \$3.62 a train mile. Operating costs, including interest and depreciation, were \$1.13 a train mile, leaving net earnings of \$2.49 a mile. However, a porportionate share of track expenses, taxes, solicitation and miscellaneous costs are not taken into consideration, it being difficult to accurately allocate such charges against the operation of a single

When the Hiawatha began service May 29, 1935, it consisted of eight cars, all newly built, and drawn by brightly hued streamlined steam locomotives. October 11, 1936, the original train was replaced by new and improved equipment, each unit now consisting of nine air condi-
