Faucet handles are set at an angle on an inclined and beveled corner "instrument panel," intended to afford more comfort and convenience to the user, particularly for the hurried morning toilet, and at the same time assure that all drippings from the hands will drain back into the bowl-a thought from the appearangles.

In addition, the new Coronet has a special raised "dry" shelf back of the faucets for the purpose of keeping powder, toilettries, etc., dry and out of the way during hurried toilets The snout is raised well above the rim of the bowl to eliminate danger of cross-connections and back-siphonage of waste water into fresh water lines-in line with the recommendations of health authorities.

The usual liberal storage space is provided inside the cabinet, which Local Committee is of baker enamel on steel and of a design that assures quiet operation of doors but secure fastening. The large basin, which has splash
