

### Crane Co. Adds New Type Lavatory to Plumbing Fixtures

A new cabinet lavatory has been added to the series of advanced design plumbing fixtures introduced by Crane Co. within the last twelve months. This, the Coronet, incorporates the same-in-door shelves which proved so popular in previous cabinet-lavatory styles and likewise has the piano-hinge doors, but instead of the conventional type of lavatory basin, it has a special new vitreous-china top of unique design.

Faucet handles are set at an angle on an inclined and beveled corner "instrument panel," intended to afford more comfort and convenience to the user, particularly for the hurried morning toilet, and at the same time assure that all drippings from the hands will drain back into the bowl—a thought from the appearance and ease-in-keeping-clean angles.

In addition, the new Coronet has a special raised "dry" shelf back of the faucets for the purpose of keeping powder, toiletries, etc., dry and out of the way during hurried toilet. The spout is raised well above the rim of the bowl to eliminate danger of cross-connections and back-siphonage of waste water into fresh water lines—in line with the recommendations of health authorities.

The usual liberal storage space is provided inside the cabinet, which is of baker enamel on steel and of a design that assures quiet operation of doors but secure fastening.

The large basin, which has splash lip, is rectangular, as is the general shape of the entire fixture. The front of the cabinet and lavatory are slightly concave to permit closer approach for washing—the sides and back slightly convex.

The Coronet has been given the lever-action Securo quick draining waste fixture, a popular trimming because of simple and sturdy construction and positive action. It, like the faucet handles and escutcheons is chromium plated.

Faucet spout is integral; seats renewable. The "P" trap is chromium plated cast brass; 1 1/4 inch. The lavatory size is 24x20, the basin 16x11, and the shipping weight approximately 170 pounds. Towel bars are optional, but the cabinet is supplied with holes drilled for the bars. The sub-base, in black baked enamel, has set-back for toe space.

The styling incorporates both the Neuvogue motif and the Corwith lines, so long a distinctive feature in Crane fixtures—in order that this cabinet-lavatory may team with either Corwith or Neuvogue bathroom schemes. It may be obtained in colors as well as white.

### Deerfield Trustees Accept Resignation of Fire Chieftain

Never in the history of Deerfield has such a large and excitable audience gathered to observe a meeting of the village trustees, as assembled on Tuesday evening to hear the proceedings of the June meeting. Mayor C. M. Willman was in the chair; present were all trustees—Ralph Peterson, Edwin Palmer, Marshall Pottenger, William Hertel, John D. Schneider, and Harry Stuppel; Clerk Chester Wessling, and Corporation Counsel George McGaughey.

The usual routine of business was transacted. Announcement was made that water bills will contain a notice that dog licenses are available at the city hall.

Ralph Peterson, chairman of the police and fire department, introduced R. F. La Due of Chicago (brother-in-law of Ernest Hagberg of Deerfield), who described an alleged arrest made within the village by Fire Chief Jack Johnston and Trustee Edwin Palmer on May 30. His complaint was referred to the police committee and to the Corporation Counsel for action. V. William Bridle of Highland Park, representing Mr. Palmer, made a few remarks. This complaint was what had drawn the large audience.

The resignation of the fire chief was accepted by the board and Conrad Uchman was appointed to succeed him.

The question of pigs and garbage dumping within the village limits by William Bubert on the Edwin Easton farm was freely discussed and an injunction will be issued to prohibit the dumping.

Mr. German asked permission to operate a junk yard and auto "grave yard" within the village. The matter was turned over to the license committee.

A request of the three protestant churches at the last meeting of the board, to prohibit Sunday carnivals, and the sale of intoxicating liquors at such affairs was discussed at a previous special meeting and Mayor Willman announced that Sunday carnivals will continue to be allowed but the sale of liquors will be permitted only in taverns and other licensed places.

A special meeting has been called for Thursday evening, June 17. The next regular meeting will be on Tuesday evening, July 6.
