Summer Term at Lake College of Commerce Opens

Summer time, to many young people, means a time for rest and relaxation. To others it means play and recreation, but to the discerning few, the long, lazy days of vacation time are not nearly so desirable as the quickly passing moments that can be so advantageously used for obtaining that little extra start in one's business training. That early beginning may mean dollars in the way of securing a position before next year's rush of spring graduates have yet completed their courses and literally mobbed the employment agencies of the country.

It is with this thought in mind that the Lake College of Commerce, in Waukegan, opened their regular summer term Monday, at 8:15. However, taking into consideration that young people must have some time for rest and play, classes will run through the morning only, with a half hour off for a snack at noon, and the final dismissal bellinging at 1:45.

As has been demonstrated during past years, many students who are planning to go to college, or who have already had several years of

university work, find that a knowledge of typing and shorthand is almost indispensable in carrying on their lecture and theme courses. The intensive training offered in these subjects during the summer months is considered by many as great boon to them in their winter studies. If the student desires, however, he may take only one or the other of these twin arts, which will be handled under the competent direction of Miss Marjorie Best, beginning shorthand teacher, and Walter Brunet, typing instructor.

The same type of courses that are offered in the fall will be given in the summer session, with the exception of certain discussion periods which will be eliminated in order to leave the afternoon free. Mrs. Helen Quarnstrom, the college manager, will be in charge of advance classes, and Mr. Louis J. Johnson, whose bookkeeping students have won first place in international contests, will be assisted during the summer months by William Reaume, a graduate of Notre Dame, who has had actual accounting experience in the offices of Paul Pettengill & Co.

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Do You Know Illinois?

A. Juliet, for Juliet Campbell, daughter of the founder. By an act of the State Legislature the name was changed in honor of Louis Joliet the French explorer.

Q. Who was Charles F. Adams?

A. An outstanding naturalist. It was Adams who prepared the Illinois Natural History exhibit at the Columbian Exposition.

Q. Where does the Constitution

of Illinois place the supreme authority for public education?

A. In the General Assembly.

Q. How does Illinois rank with the other states in its support of private schools?

A. Illinois ranks 36th.

Q. When was the Illinois Education Association formed?

A. December 26, 1853 at Bloomington, Illinois.

Q. What was the association originally called?

A. The Illinois Teachers' Institute. The present name was adopted in 1860.

Q. How many institutions for the insane are there in Illinois?

A. 10. There were 27,473 inmates in these institutions last year.
