Make Preparations for Motor Trip in Advance Is Advice

Although preparing for a motor trip today is much less complicated than it was ten or twelve years ago, the comfort and the convenience of the trip is considerably enhanced by making complete preparations ahead of time, Bert Vanderwarf, head of the touring and travel bureau of the Chicago Motor club, declared today.

"A decade or two ago," said Mr. Vanderwarf, "an extended motor journey required extensive preparation. Before leaving home the motorist, decked out in goggles and duster, would place in his car a supply of fuel, a spade for digging out of mud holes, tire repair equipment, tools for tinkering with the engine, two chains, food and water supplies, and whatnot.

"Today, with service facilities along almost every mile of highway, preparations for the journey are much simpler. The principal precautions that should be taken before leaving are to have the car placed in A-1 mechanical condition and to secure a complete mapping of the journey ahead.

"It is advisable to obtain maps for the entire journey days or even weeks prior to leaving on the trip. This will make it possible to study the route, which will curtail delay in asking directions enroute, and also will make possible selection of the best course to take when alternate routes are available. At the same time, it is advisable to make daily checks with motor clubs along the highway to learn of any recent changes in road conditions."

Arlington Park Will Open Racing Season on June 28

Every divisional leader and major contender is included in the nominations for the Arlington Park stakes, six of which closed officially on June 1, while the Arlington Futurity and Lassie Stakes received final fees on May 15.

Although the final returns have not yet been compiled the lists for the \$30,000 Classic Stakes, the \$20,000 Arlington Handicap, the \$10,000 Stars and Stripes Handicap and the \$5,000 Arlington Inaugural Handicap are already notably larger than last year.

"Horsemen could not have more strongly set their stamp of approval upon our expanded stake and purse program than by their splendid response to our eight stakes," declared Otto W. Lehman, president of the Arlington Jockey club, which will launch its "Golden Thirty Days" of racing here on June 28.

Lehman referred to the increase in added money from \$10,000 to \$20,000 in the Arlington Handicap; the advance from \$2,500 to \$5,000 in Inaugural; the revival of the matron for fillies and mares 3-year-olds and \$5,000 Matron Handicap, a mile test upward; and the establishment of the \$1,100 purse minimum, the highest in America.

The revival of the Matron, in line with the movement to provide more racing opportunities for fillies and mares, brought excellent response when 37 stars of this sex were named, reported Roy Carruthers, secretary and general manager of the Chicago meeting.

The \$2,500 Hyde Park Stakes, a venerable fixture of the west for 2-year-olds, gives indication of dropping below last year's record nomination list but the race still retains the leaders of the eastern and western juvenile colonies.

The Arlington Futurity, which will gross more than \$52,000 this year, closed with 101 nominations including six of the highest priced colts of the 1936 yearling sales and all of the best 21-yr.-olds which have raced to date. The Lassie Stakes, major western test for juvenile fillies, closed with 75 nominations and likely will gross more than \$34,000.

A total of \$371,000 will be distributed to horsemen in purses, added money in stakes, an special trainers' awards by the Arlington Park Jockey club during the "Golden Thirty Days" will be the climax of the social and racing season in this section. Of this amount \$102,500 is added money for the eight stakes that provide the highlights of the meeting.

Box reservations for opening day, June 28, are pouring into the Arlington Park offices. "The demand has never been so heavy for the inaugural and, even at this early date, we have received many reservations for Classic Day, July 24," reported Carruthers.

Steve Hannagan, director of public relations for Arlington Park, will arrive in Chicago Monday morning from Salt Lake City. Larry Smits and Ned Moss, who will get in from New York Sunday, and Jimmy Loftus, who has been in charge of the Arlington press office in Chicago for the past month, will join Hannagan in drafting plans for the opening of the meeting at a conference here Monday.

Hydrangea Bears Lilac Blossoms

When is a hydrangea not a hydrangea? The answer, is "when it's a lilac."

In fact the following story which recently appeared in a county newspaper, seems almost worthy of recognition in Ripley's "Believe It or Not" column.

The unbelievable case is that of a hydrangea bush which has been crossed with lilacs on the premises of the Renhan lodge at Round lake. The hydrangea bush is located approximately 25 feet from the closest of several lilac bushes. The bush leafed out as usual this spring, and lo and behold, when the lilac bushes were about to end their blooming period, the hydrangea bush came into bloom, not hydrangea blooms, however, but the most perfect lilac blooms that were ever grown on a lilac bush.

J. A. Scanlan Heads Engineering Division for R. B. Whitaker

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


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
