

R. B. Whitaker Will Attend Conference at Paris Exposition

Robert B. Whitaker, president of the R. B. Whitaker Company, large North Shore real estate and construction firm, is sailing from the United States aboard the Queen Mary on June 23rd to attend the International Housing conference at the Paris exposition, as the official representative of the National Association of Real Estate Boards.

In Paris, Mr. Whitaker, who is vice-president of the national group, will be joined by Herbert U. Nelson, executive secretary. After the Paris conference has ended, they will travel together throughout western and central Europe as official representatives of the American real estate industry.

Their purpose will be to make a study of housing conditions and scientific advances in construction and architecture in the various countries which they visit, as compared with our own advances during the last few years.

In several of these nations, housing has now become a state or municipal function and government officials and housing authorities will accompany Mr. Whitaker and Mr. Nelson on their inspection tours of the newest projects.

After viewing the latest real estate developments in France, Whitaker and Nelson will go to Geneva, Switzerland. Their tour of inspection will then take them through Genoa, Florence and Venice in Italy; to Vienna in Austria; to several cities in Germany; and on to Amsterdam in Holland.

The final and most comprehensive visit on Mr. Whitaker's itinerary is in England, where conferences have been arranged with the heads of the major English real estate societies, and where a special study will be made of the reconditioning of old properties, which has proved singularly successful in London. A detailed study will also be made of English financing methods, which are supposed to be the basis for our own federal financing agencies and which have been the subject of much controversy in this country.

The second group arrives July 14, and five days later, on July 19, the annual summer picnic, to which all board and committee members, and their guests are invited, will be held. The picnic starts at noon, with luncheon served out under the trees, to be followed by a program given by camp grandmothers, mothers and the youngsters.
