## Boy Scout News

### Camp Enrollment Almost Full

If you don't want to be disappointed get your camp application for Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan into Scout headquarters just as soon as possible. Applications are still coming in every day and there are just a few places left.

The scouts registered for first period leave this Saturday on the Flambeau for Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan. The second period scouts leave on the 10th of July and the third period scouts leave on the 24th of July.

### Scout Jamboree Construction

Construction of a tent city which will house some 25,000 boys from all sections of the nation is well under way in Washington, D.C. In preparation for the National Boy Scout Jamboree which will be held upon the banks of the Potomac, June 30 to July 9.

Many scouts from this locality will be privileged to encamp upon the 350-acre site loaned by Congress to the Boy Scouts of America, according to Dr. James E. West, chief scout executive. The jamboree city, actually comprising 25 smaller "villages," will be laid out along the Potomac adjacent to the Arlington bridge and practically beneath the shadow of the towering Washington monument. The construction of headquarters, kitchens and storage tents, sanitary facilities, and dining quarters to service the 25,000 scouts will be completed and quarters will be ready for occupancy by June 29.

### RECENT BOOKS

*Your Every Speech* by William Norwood Brigrance. Many books have been written on speaking in public, but this one concerns your everyday speech, at the dining table and in the living room, on the telephone and across the counter, in the office and on the street. Professor Brigrance discusses the common faults of American speech, its variations in different parts of the country, and the only standard which may properly be applied in judging it—namely, that the speaker should employ the best speech for his particular region. He explains exactly what good diction is, how the sound of the different letters are produced, and how good speech habits may be developed. The many diagrams and photographs show clearly how the voice should be used, and a few simple but very helpful exercises are provided.

*Marconi: The Man and His Wireless*, by Orrin E. Dunlap, Jr. Here is the fascinating story of Guglielmo Marconi, whose father was Italian and whose mother was Irish. The invention and the inventor are inseparable, in this case, and this portrait of Marconi is also a comprehensive history of radio. The author portrays the unique personality of the man against the background of his invention.

*Life in a Haitian Valley*, by Milville J. Herskovits. The people of Haiti have usually been described as hysterical fanatics, their entire life revolving around the mysterious "voodoo" cult, while a few writers have described them as happy, child-like, "primitives." Both pic-

tures are false—and, as is often the case, the facts are far more interesting and significant than the legends. Here the facts, for perhaps the first time, are dealt with by a man of unquestionable authority. In presenting his exhaustive study of peasant life in the remote valley of Mirebalais, Professor Herskovits first discusses the African and French origins of Haitian customs, then describes the daily round and the religious beliefs and ceremonies, and finally analyzes the attitude of the Haitian toward the world, the powers that rule it, and the psychology of "voodoo" and Haitian magic. Thus the reader is enabled to understand what sort of person the Haitian is and what kind of life he actually leads.

*Brothers of Light*, by Alice Corbin Henderson. In New Mexico, during Lent and Holy Week each year, the Penitent Brotherhood enacts a primitive Passion Play, which

in its traditional ritual and self-torture represents a cruelties survival of the Middle Ages. Much lurid journalism has been devoted to the Penitents, but in this sympathetic account by an eye-witness, the ceremonies are presented in their true aspect, with the historic background and reason for the survival clearly indicated. From this it appears that the religious custom of self-inflicted penance was introduced into the Southwest as early as 1498 by the Franciscan priests who accompanied Don Juan de Onate and his soldiers and colonists on their way to the permanent settlement of the province of New Mexico—originally embracing all of our present southwest. From that day to this the customs then inaugurated have been traditionally observed by the humble descendants of the Conquistadores.
