This season when he returns Ravinia Park to direct the Chicago Symphony Orchestra in the second week's concerts of July 8, 9, 10, and 11, he will be welcomed by the many friends inspired by his personal charm as well as his musicianly direction of his concerts last summer.

In 1918 Ansermet established the Orchestra of French Switzerland, and has kept his affiliation with it ever since. Following his American tour of last summer, when he opened no less than three summer festivals, those of the Ravinia festival, the Hollywood Bowl and the St. Malo concerts in San Francisco, he presented an All-Debussy season at Geneva, Switzerland, during the session of the League of Nations.

So much in demand is Ansermet as a conductor, that his season's activities read like an international Baedecker. Aside from his annual visits to Stockholm and Oslo, where he is a great favorite, his season's activities lead him into Russia, Holland, Belgium, and Germany, and to London, this year for the Coronation celebration.

Highwood has never established a park district and inasmuch as the American Legion is not in a financial position to purchase a tract of land to meet this need, there are no funds available for the project. However, it is felt that there may be some one who has a piece of property that would be glad to either have used for this project, or perhaps some big hearted person will donate the land to the City of High-

The need for such a park is evident, for many children are compelled to play in the streets. If a park was available all play could be concentrated in that section, thus safe guarding the lives of the chil-

Several locations are being considered. It is the desire of the sponsors that such a playground will include a baseball diamond, tennis courts, wading pool and swing. With all organizations and citizens supporting this venture the dream may come a reality.
