Jake Eissler Is Sentenced to 1-20 Year Prison Term

J. H. "Jake" Eissler, 63-year-old professional dynamiter of Long Grove, last Thursday was sentenced from one to 20 years in the penitentiary for the bombing on May 8 of the home of Charles C. Kapschull at 814 Spruce st., Deerfield.

Eissler appeared before Judge Ralph J. Dady with his counsel, Attorney Earl K. Cook, and pleaded guilty to the indictment charging him with destruction of property by explosives.

He withdrew a former plea of not guilty and persisted in entering a plea of guilty to the charge.

"You are guilty?" Judge Dady inquired of Eissler.

"Yes," Eissler stated. "I was out of my head."

"Do you know what you are doing now?" Judge Dady asked.

"Yes," Eissler replied. "I'm sorry I did it."

State's Attorney Charles E. Mason reviewed the charges against Eissler in the indictment returned by the grand jury and submitted the statute which requires an indeterminate sentence of one to 20 years.
