

### Children from Playgrounds Will Attend Sox Game

The children from all the playgrounds in Highland Park are being entertained next Tuesday afternoon by the management of the Chicago White Sox. At that time the children are to witness a game between the White Sox and the Cleveland Indians. All children on the playgrounds are invited to go. From the time the boys and girls leave the playgrounds until their return they will be supervised and led by members of the playground staff. Buses will be used for transportation and will make stops at all the various playgrounds. Those children wishing to attend this game and who have not as yet signed up with the instructors on the playgrounds should do so at once for it is necessary that transportation facilities be arranged for in advance. A small charge is made each child to cover the cost of the buses. More information may be had by calling the Park Board office, H. P. 2763, or from the instructors on the playgrounds.

The swimming classes from the playgrounds have been unusually well attended this summer. Every Wednesday and Friday morning these lessons are given on the Central and Roger Williams Beaches to all children present. The instruction is given by experienced swimming teachers from the playground staff assisted by the life guards on the beaches. Water safety and caution are taught as well as the rudiments of swimming. Classes are held for beginners as well as for more advanced swimmers. It is not necessary that the children go to the beach with the group from the playgrounds, but if they report directly to the beaches they must observe the rules of discipline and safety that are followed by the other groups.
