To Stockholders of The Highland Park Hospital Association.

As a stockholder of the Highland Park Hospital Association, you will be interested to know that we are about to take the final steps of the plans long under consideration to vest the ownership of the Hospital in the Community.

The Highland Park Hospital Association not for profit, was organized many years ago to build and operate the Highland Park Hospital. Stock certificates were issued at that time to those who donated funds for the erection of the building. The advantages which necessitated that form of organization have long since disappeared. The Hospital has been from the beginning a community enterprise, in fact; it is now desirable that it take the form of a Community enterprise. Those citizens who have been actively interested believe that a permanent organization should be set up so that the control of the Hospital is in the hands of a larger group which would more nearly represent the entire Community and which would be actively and intimately interested in the management of the Hospital.

In accordance with this idea the Highland Park Hospital Foundation was incorporated on February 11, 1937, under the laws of the State of Illinois as a corporation not for profit. Under the Charter of the Foundation the memership of the corporation would be forty five in number, known as Trustees, one-third of whom would be elected each year for a term of three years, thus insuring to the citizens of Highland Park the direct interest of at least forty-five representative citizens in the affairs of the Hospital. The active management of the affairs and funds will be in the hands of a Board of nine Managers elected by the Trustees of the Foundation. This Board will be responsible to the Trustees and through them to the Community.

It is the intention of the Present Board of Managers of the Association to cause the assets of the Hospital to be conveyed to the Foundation. Out of the total stock outstanding, 5347 shares or 621/2% have already been turned over to the Board of Managers and Trustees for this purpose.

In order that the present plan may be consummated in one step and completed at an early date, we urge you to turn in your stock certificate. If your stock certificate is lost or mislaid, you can sign the enclosed assignment and send it in lieu of your certificate. The assignment is filled in in accordance with our records.

I feel that the best interests of the Hospital and of the City of Highland Park will be served by the donation of the remaining outstanding stock of the Highland Park Hospital Association. I recommend your favorable action at an early date.
