A group of warring natives are forced by the terms of a will to live together for a period, in a gloomy old house. A series of murders occurs among them and Philo Vance solves the mystery. Adults.

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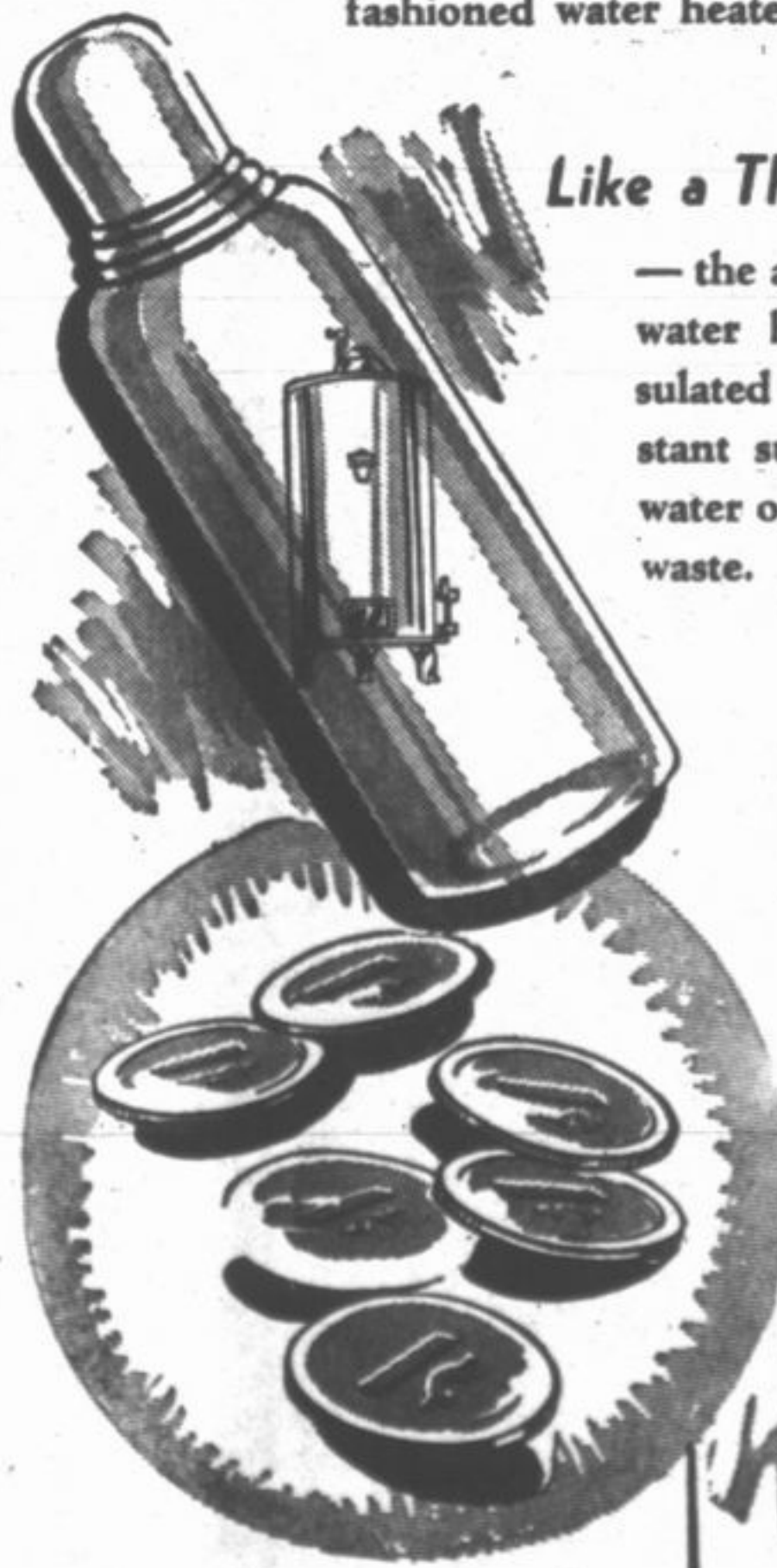
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
