Fort Sheridan Plays Meadowbrook Sunday

The Fort Sheridan polo team, which has been victorious in its last five games, will play the excellent team of the Meadowbrook Club of Milwaukee, Sunday, July 18th, at 3:30 p.m., at the north polo field

of Fort Sheridan. The Meadowbrook team, made up of Kornitz, Ehlers, Wangerin, and Meiers, has this year compiled a fine record as it has always done. The Fort Sheridan aggregation, composed of Colonel Davison, Major Morris, Captains Greiner, Hutchinson, and Jernigan, has improved steadily over its early season performances. C.C.C. Enrollment Is Extended to July 31

The final date of the enrollment period has been extended from July 20 to July 31.

Boys and young men between the ages of 17 and 23 years inclusive who are in need of employment are permitted to enroll in the Civilian Conservation Corps during July, according to the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission, which has charge of CCC certifications in this state.

Under previous Federal regulations, enrollment was limited to members of families receiving public assistance. Present legislation, however, opens this service to other young men, if they need this employment "to provide themselves or their dependents with a proper and adequate standard of living."

Selection may also be made of single men without dependents when priority groups have not filled the

county quotas. These young men, otherwise fully qualified, may be selected upon arrangement to establish CCC deposits on an amount identical with that normally made to dependents (\$25.00 per month).

Besides working on reclamation on other outdoor projects, members of the CCC will be given vocational training and other opportunities to increase their experience and general adaptability, as the program is intended not only to provide useful employment for them while they are in the service, but also to make them better able to meet their responsibilities after their CCC service has ended.

While the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission is in charge of certifications, applications must be made to township supervisors, who, as local relief officials, must advise the commission as to the financial

needs of the applicants, since preference in selection will be given in the order of financial need, should the number of applications exceed the state quota.
