

AN ORDINANCE TERMED THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL IN AND BY WHICH THE CORPORATE AUTHORITIES DO APPROPRIATE SUCH SUMS OR SUMS OF MONEY WHICH MAY BE DEEMED NECESSARY TO DEFEND ALL NECESSARY EXPENSES AND ALL LIABILITIES OF THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING THE FIRST DAY OF MAY, A. D. 1937, AND ENDING ON THE THIRTIETH DAY OF APRIL, A. D. 1938, AND SPECIFYING THE OBJECTS AND PURPOSES FOR WHICH SUCH APPROPRIATIONS WERE MADE TOGETHER WITH THE AMOUNT APPROPRIATED FOR EACH OBJECT OR PURPOSE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS: SECTION 1. That the following sum or sums of money, or so much thereof as may be authorized by law, be and the same are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes herein specified to defray all necessary expenses and liabilities, and for all corporate purposes of the Village of Deerfield, Lake County, Illinois, for the fiscal year beginning the first day of May, A. D. 1937, and ending on the thirtieth day of April, A. D. 1938.

SECTION 2. The unexpended balance of any item or items of any appropriation made by this Ordinance may be expended in making up any deficiency in any item or items in the same general appropriation, and for the same general purpose, or in a like appropriation made by this Ordinance.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication in accordance with the laws.

SECTION 4. That this Ordinance be published in an official newspaper of the Village of Deerfield.
