

Much Interest Is Manifest In State Semi-Finals Series

Marked interest is being displayed by the increasing number of inquiries in the community and from out-of-town concerning tickets for the Illinois State Junior Legion semi-final baseball series to be played in Highland Park Saturday and Sunday, July 24 and 25, which will be held at the High School Athletic field and which is being sponsored by the Dumaresq Spencer post of the American Legion.

This series which will bring together the four winning teams from all over the state outside of Cook County will begin on Saturday, July 24, at 1:30 p.m., the day of the quarter finals when two games will be played. The winners will meet for the semi-finals on Sunday afternoon the following day and the victorious team will meet the winner of the Cook County series being sponsored by the Chicago Daily News.

Because this event is being participated in by teams throughout the entire state and because of the keen interest and competition being displayed in the play-off now taking place, many of the players and Legion men interested have expressed the intention of coming to Highland Park to see the semi-final series.

The visiting players, coaches and others who will accompany them and who will attend will in itself make up a party of over a hundred persons who will be visitors and the local Legion post who is sponsoring the event will, as part of the project, arrange for their entertainment and living accommodations during their stay.

The committee in charge under the direction of Commander Miller Schreiner and of which Mr. Burt Green is chairman, consists of Harry Chambers, Edwin Gilroy, Phil Cole, Leslie Stanger, John Peters, Edw. Benson, and H. B. Alston. The committee in charge of special arrangements will include Senior Vice-Commander Wm. Heinrichs, Vice-Commander Paul Webb, Chaplain Henry Hanson, and Arthur Swanson.

Every effort will be made to make this an outstanding event and a gala two days in Highland Park. Com. Schreiner announces that while the Legion is sponsoring the program, nevertheless, because of its civic aspect all groups and business men's organizations are welcome to take part and that everyone is cordially invited to attend. Arrangements may be made for participating by communicating with the committee and tickets may be had at all local drug stores, sporting goods shops and from any member of the American Legion.

Evangelical Church Celebrates Centennial

The one hundredth anniversary of the founding of the first Evangelical church in Illinois is to be commemorated at the North Northfield cemetery on Dundee road near Saunders road on Sunday afternoon, July 25, at two o'clock. This locality at the intersection of those two roads was the original site of the first church of that denomination in the state. The burial ground of the pioneers was at the rear of the church, at the northwest corner, where the first church stood. That property was sold, except the cemetery, but the new owners have closed it off as a chicken yard and at present it is in litigation in Cook County courts.

Churches of this following have stood on three of the four corners during the past hundred years. The second cemetery selected by this church, about a mile east of the original site is to be the scene of the unveiling and dedication of a marker on July 25. The afternoon's program will include music by the Prairie View Concert band; an address by Bishop George Edward Esp of Naperville, "What Mean These Stones"; unveiling and dedicatory address by Bishop Emeritus S. P. Spring of Naperville; an historical sketch of the Evangelical church by Rev. J. G. Schwab of Chicago, who has written a book of the history of the church now being published.

The centennial celebration is open to the public.

F. J. Greenebaum Files Bankruptcy Petition

Frederic J. Greenebaum, 901 N. Sheridan road, Chicago banker, has filed a voluntary petition of bankruptcy in the United States District court. No schedule was filed, but Attorney A. L. Shapiro, who filed the petition, said that Greenebaum's financial position consisted of liabilities of about \$250,000 and no assets.

The principal liabilities are an assessment of \$50,000 of stock holdings in the Central Republic Trust company, of which he was a vice president, and an assessment of \$5,000 on stock held in the Calumet National bank, which failed in 1931. Greenebaum was associated with the Greenebaum Sons Bank and Trust company from 1916 to 1926. The name was changed to the Bank of America in 1927, with which he was a vice president. This bank consolidated with the Central Trust Company of Illinois in 1929, which in turn merged into the Central Republic Bank and Trust company in 1931.

Feature No. 1—"King of Gamblers." Cast: Claire Trevor, Lloyd Nolan, Akim Tamiroff, Helen Burgess, Wednesday, Thursday, July 14 and 15. The slot machine business and its gambling and racketeering ramifications bring to the screen an unusually interesting crime picture. The plot presents several new angles as well as an expose of the racket and clearly shows that crime does not pay. It is capably acted and directed. Adults.

Feature No. 2—"You Can't Buy Luck." Cast: Anslow Stevens, Helen Mach, Hedda Hopper, Paul Guilfoyle, Wednesday, Thursday, July 14 and 15. This is interesting from the story standpoint as it presents a side of the professional gambler—seldom brought to light. The debonair gambler who buys his luck when and where he needs it. The story builds to a logical climax with a murder as the high point. Not recommended for children because of the characterization necessary to the unfolding of the plot. Adults.

"Cafe Metropole." Cast: Loretta Young, Tyrone Power, Adolphe Menjou, Gregory Ratoff, Friday and Saturday, July 16 and 17. Excellent cast and done in continental manner. A bright romantic comedy far above average in entertainment value. The picture is gently satirical in tone—clever in dialogue and tops in direction. Adults.

"Shall We Dance." Cast: Ginger Rogers, Fred Astaire, Eric Blaire, Harriet Hoster, Edward Everett Horton, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, July 18, 19 and 20. An important plot—lavishly staged—with beautifully clear photography, exquisite ballets and amusing situations. The musical score is particularly interesting—especially the engine room sequence in which negro voices and the orchestra blend with the beat of machinery. Adults.

Feature No. 1—"Wings of the Morning." Cast: Henry Fonda, Leslie Banks, John McCormack, Wednesday and Thursday, July 21 and 22.
