

300 From Playgrounds to Attend Baseball Game in Chicago

About three hundred children from the playgrounds in Highland Park are to be the guests of the management of the Chicago Cubs at a ball game next Wednesday afternoon, July 28. All children from Highland Park are eligible to attend this game but, they must be signed up with the playground instructors before the date of the game and they must attend the game with the groups from the playgrounds. The children will be taken to the game on special trains and will be supervised by members of the playground staff who are all well prepared and experienced in this type of work. Children who have not as yet signed up for this game should do so at once. Further information may be had by contacting the instructors on the playgrounds or by calling the Park Board office, Highland Park 2763.

The playground season still has four weeks to operate so there is still ample time for any child who has not registered for the playgrounds to do so and enter into the activities. Swimming lessons are held twice each week, Wednesday and Friday mornings, for beginners as well as for advanced swimmers, other activities are also organized so that new members of the playground may be entered at any time. There is no charge for this playground activity as it is a part of the recreation program sponsored by the Park Board of Highland Park for the residence of the community. Children wishing to join the play groups may do so by reporting to the instructors on the various playgrounds.

Wednesday morning, July 28—Swimming lessons—Sunset, Lincoln, Port Clinton to Central Beach; Ravinia to Roger Williams beach.

Wednesday afternoon, July 28—Trip to Wrigley field for Cubs baseball game.

Thursday morning, July 29—Boys baseball—Sunset at Port Clinton; Lincoln at Ravinia. General program—all playgrounds.

Thursday afternoon, July 29—Sunset—Pet show; general program. Lincoln—Beach picnic; scavenger hunt; Ravinia—Badminton and tennis instruction.

Friday morning, July 30—Swimming lessons—Sunset, Lincoln, Port Clinton to Central Beach; Ravinia group to Roger Williams beach.

"Indian" (J.K.) Clark Stone Righted in Deerfield Cemetery

An outstanding character in the historical data of this locality was John Kinzie Clark, more familiarly known as "Indian" Clark, who lies buried in the little Deerfield cemetery within the village. At the closing meeting of the Deerfield Woman's club in the spring it was brought to the attention of the members that the gravestones of Clark and his wife had fallen over. Miss Irene Rockenbach was appointed

chairman of a committee for the purchase of a boulder or some kind of marker for these graves.

Through the generosity of Walter Haertle of DesPlaines the original stones are being put into place free of charge. The stones are of the old-fashioned slab-type and these are being lowered into concrete bases. Inscriptions so generally used at that time cannot be preserved, as the lower part will be put into the base in order to hold up the stones in a firm foundation.
