Rock Island Lines Refunds Employees **Pension Deductions**

Announcement from the offices of officer of the Rock Island Lines, states that railroad has begun the distribution to its nearly 31,000 employees of \$1,375,000, representing the refund of deductions from pay checks and withheld to meet the requirements of the 1935 federal railway pension law which was recently amended by Congress, following an agreement between railway management and employes, to take effect as of January 1, 1937. 1, the railway company depositing an amount equal to the aggregate deposit of all the employes. It will require about ten days for the Rock Island to complete the refund to all employes in its territory.

With the new law in effect, the Rock Island railroad has discontinued its pension system, which it has maintained since 1910, and all records forwarded to the Railroad Retirement Board in Wasihngton, D. C., who will administer the new railway pension law.


