Construction of the new base was started at Curtiss Airport on the 4th of January this year and approximately \$120,000 has been spent by the Navy Department in building new shops, administration building and airplane facilities. The planes and equipment were removed from the Naval Training station at Great Lakes the 15th of May and have been at the Curtiss Airport since that time.

The new Naval Reserve Aviation base is in reality a small Naval Air Station in that it is entirely selfsupporting and can carry on all overhauls of engines and airplanes. A crew of about thirty men and two commissioned officers are on duty throughout the year at the base.
