Italian Second Year A first year of Italian has been taught here for several years, and has so grown in popularity that for the first time we are offering a second year which will stress increased ability to use the spoken and written language as well as to furnish the student with a wider reading program giving them some of the Italian cultural background.

Junior Nursing The course in Junior Nursing offers to girls of the sophomore, junior, and senior years an opportunity to learn how to take care of children. They will spend a half day in our own nursery school (to be located in the Rogers house near the auto shop).

Problems in Democracy This course is designed to acquaint the student with a few of the problems that are at present confronting our country. In selecting the problems, attention is given to the interests of the pupils now as well as after graduation.

The awards were made by a committee of judges composed of Prof. Lloyd D. Herrold, Northwestern university; George W. Barton, safety director, Chicago Motor Club; and Roger B. Stafford, managing editor, "Super Service Station Magazine," Chicago.

During the survey, which was carried on for a period of six weeks, thousands of reports were turned in by motorists in thirteen central western states. Of the 122 car

drivers who were awarded prizes, the majority stated that cleaning the windshield by the gasoline dealer was the most important service for the safety, comfort and convenience of the motorists, while next in importance was having the tires inflated and the oil in the crank case checked.
