Kimball Estate Is Appraised by State

The estate of Curtis Nathaniel Kimball, pioneer Chicago piano manufacturer, who died July 30, 1936, at his home, 320 South Green Bay road, Highland Park, amounts to \$560,874, according to a report which Assistant Attorney General Charles Noll will present to the Lake County court today.

When admitted to probate last fall the estate was estimated at \$250,000. Mr. Noll's report, approved by H. H. Benjamin, executor of the estate, shows that the state inheritance tax amounts to \$12,910 and the government estate tax \$113,550. The estate was left to Kimball's widow, Fannie H., and three children: Mrs. Mary K. Van Steenderen, William W., and David W.
