Building Figures Take Upward Trend

With the Highland Park August building total reaching \$161,681, the consecutive monthly declines were stopped at three according to a report issued today.

Last month's construction not only emerged from the three-month slump, which hit bottom in July with a total of \$86,940, but showed a small advance over the figure of \$151,997 for August 1936.

Besides the permits taken out for six new dwellings, estimated to cost \$84,000, the board of education of district 108 took out a permit to start a \$35,000 addition to the Ravinia school.

Permits for new Highland Park residences include those of Jules Ladany, 291 Cary ave., \$30,000; F. G. Hough, 650 Waverly rd., \$22,000, and Judson S. Cross, 687 Delta rd., \$10,000.
