Legionnaires of Deerfield post No. 738, at their regular meeting Monday evening in the Masonic Temple building, were treated to a trip to "Boys' State," as related by the two lads who were the representatives of the post and its Auxiliary unit. Charles Kapschull Jr. and Harold A. Frost, who participated in this third annual Legion project, attended a week's session at Springfield, June 20 to 27. Their accounts of the activities, the tours, and the routine were most interesting, and evidenced the value of the plan in government. Both young men concluded their reports with the statement that attendance at Boys' State is worthwhile, and recommended that other lads be given a like opportunity.

It is interesting to note that this plan, originated in Illinois three years ago, was followed in eight states this year, giving practical training in the science of government to more than 3,700 boys. In Illinois the project has grown so enthusiastically that two separate camps may be necessary another year to accommodate the increasing large delegations.

Season football tickets are being sold in the session rooms this week. Highland Park meets Waukegan in the first home game on Saturday, September 25th. The Crystal Lake game was cancelled as they have not yet opened due to the infantile paralysis situation. The game will be played later, probably on November 6.

of her own home. But her aggressive activity in her many outside interests could easily give one the impression that this or that in which she was working at the time was her major interest. The people who knew her well will miss the stimulation and the help of her friendship and service but they will be grateful that they have had the privilege of knowing her. It is safe to say that very many people now are quietly rededicating themselves to a finer and a more aggressive way of life because of the passing of this woman whom they held in such high regard.

In the tragic passing of Mrs. Benjamin Ball, the Highland Park Music club has suffered an irreparable loss. An accomplished musician of great ability and talent, she gave most generously of her time to the club, inspiring its members to work and so to maintain a high standard of musicianship. She joined the club in September 1930 after having been invited to appear as a guest artist in May of the same year. Since then she has appeared often either as pianist or organist; served on the program committee, acted as news commentator in 1935, and in June 1936 was elected president. In this capacity she guided the club through one of the most successful years and was re-elected in May 1937 to again serve as president.

Because of her careful planning and friendly co-operation, every detail of the coming club year has been completed and will be carried on as outlined. The September meeting scheduled for Wednesday the 22nd, however will be postponed until September 29.

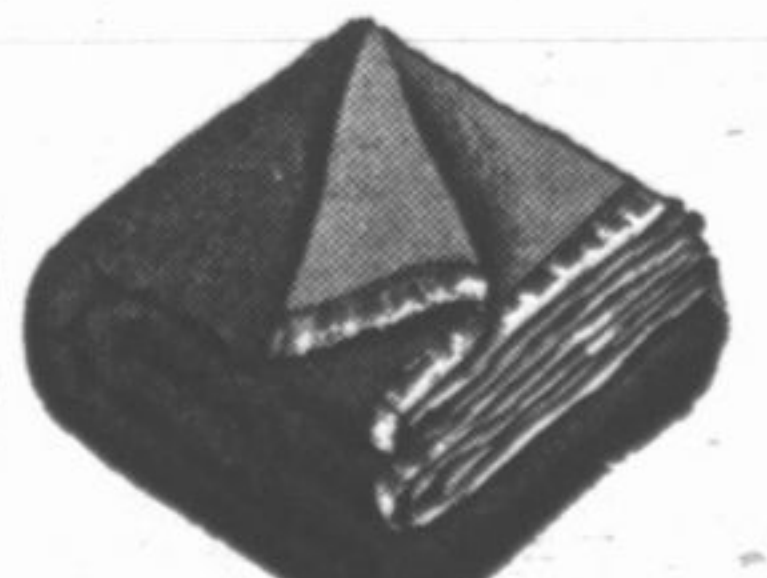
