

Y.W.C.A. Directors Discuss Activities for Coming Year

Busy chairmen announced plans for committee meetings and plenty of work for volunteer workers at the first meeting of the Board of Directors of the Young Women's Christian association on Tuesday. Mrs. T. L. Osborn, president, opened the meeting with an inspirational talk on the significance the Y. W. C. A. can have in the lives of all girls and woman in the community. Devotionals led by Mrs. Clifford Hawes, religious education chairman, developed this "sharing" idea. Mrs. J. B. Garnett, finance chairman, presented new bills for approval and Mrs. L. F. Harza gave the treasurer's report for the summer months. The resignation of Mrs. Lee Frank as education chairman was accepted with regret and appreciation of her work. Mrs. Eugene Pfister and Earl Fritsch were appointed to develop two new class projects which have been requested.

The approval of the neighbors and passers-by on the new paint for the exterior, and the interior improvements which add to the comfort of those using the house were mentioned in the house report of Mrs. Theodore Fischer, chairman. The electric refrigerator which is shared with residents doing their own cooking and the screened-in porch were this summer additions. Using the corners of the assembly room for bedrooms with portable wooden partitions meant increased accommodations for transients during the vacation period. A growing demand for rooms at the Y by younger employed business girls was reported. The statistical report given by Mrs. J. B. Garnett showed that even in the vacation month of August the Y is a center of much coming and going. There were 172 callers, 65 attended the Mothers' club card party, so many came to the carnival that no count could be kept, and 34 extra overnight guests were accommodated.

Miss Adele Everett reported for the committee studying the need for a recreational program for colored women employed in the community. It was found that most of these were members of Chicago families so that they preferred to go into the city on their time off. For the present an effort will be made to cooperate in making available Waukegan activities if there are young women interested.

General plans for continuing educational tours, club programs, monthly Sunday afternoon vespers, Leadership Council study under the sponsorship of enlarged committees were spoken of by Miss Mary Robe, executive secretary. Organization plans for the high school girls' association were mentioned by Mrs. Andrew Bradt. Mrs. Earl Fritsch, membership chairman, Mrs. Lyle Gourley, social chairman, and Mrs. W. A. Alexander outlined plans for

an all-association affair which will be developed by committees meeting this week.

Sudden Death Takes Mrs. Paul Webb; Funeral Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. Paul Webb of 519 Eastwood avenue who died suddenly Saturday night were held Tuesday afternoon at the Redeemer Lutheran church. Burial was in North Shore Garden of Memories.

Her death was sudden, coming as a distinct shock to her family. On Sunday morning her husband found her dead in bed, death coming to her while she was sleeping; evidently an heart attack being the cause.

Mrs. Webb was born on July 10, 1894, in Chicago, a child of Mr. and Mrs. Christ and Anna Anderson, to whom the name of Alma Cathrine was given. She chose the career of a school teacher, receiving her education at the Iowa State Teachers college, and taught in various schools in Emmet County, Iowa.

On July 22, 1922, she was married to Mr. Paul Webb at Evanston. A year later the family moved to Highland Park, where it since has resided. Mrs. Webb took an active part in community affairs, being an officer of the Mothers club when she passed away.

Her death is mourned by her husband and their son, Paul, Jr., now seven years old. Her parents survive her and also five sisters, among whom is Mrs. L. R. Tjaden of Highland Park.
