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**Deerfield School Enrollment Is 313**

Superintendent Carl E. Bates, in telling of this year's enrollment in the Deerfield Grammar school, remarked that the effects of the depression are clearly shown in the decreased birth rate with only 23 children entered in the first grade. On Monday morning, Sept. 13, the school enrollment was 313. This total is slightly lower than last year, caused by the opening of the new Holy Cross Catholic school where 48 children are attending.

Bannockburn's enrollment of 48 is expected to be increased before the end of the month. Wilmot grade school has registered 49 pupils.
