Waukegan Defeats H. P. High School 19-0

Coach Floyd's Highland Park high school varsity eleven met a surprise foe in the Waukegan outfit last Saturday and came out on the short end of a 19-0 score. The county seat team featured a heavy, fast backfield that should make a name for itself in the Suburban league this year.

The local nine turned in a good game. The highlight of the contest, so far as Highland Park was concerned, came early in the third quarter when a blocked punt gave Waukegan the ball on the local's 10 yard line. A pass to Graham netted 7 yards. Then Pete Wolff and Company held like a brick wall for three consecutive downs.

Waukegan gains came largely by smashing line drives and off-tackle plays. Durment and Harris displayed good open field running but were unable to match the brilliance of their heavier opponents. Tommie Simpson, Lloyd Kjellquist and Pete Wolff were the best bets in the line.

Elo and Graham and Caragher made long gains for Waukegan. Graham scored all of his team's points by one touchdown in the first quarter and two in the last. He also ran over for the extra point on his second touchdown.
