Salesmanship
 Mr. Barnes

 This course includes work in pewter, aluminum and copper, also jewelry making in silver. Instruction is offered in making all kinds of simple bowls and plates, as well as the more complicated pieces which require soldering, riveting, etc. Decoration in the form of etchings, repousse work, etc., may be learned. Mr. Bolle is a former pupil of Kronquist in Milwaukee and has done very successful teaching of metal work, both at the high school and at Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan.
