## Anson C. Morgan Former Resident Dies in Georgia

Word has just been received of the death October 4th of a former resident of Highland Park, Anson Cloude Morgan, in Alto, Georgia, where he and his family have made their home since 1924.

Mr. Morgan was born in Chicago February 12th, 1869, the son of Captain Otho H. Morgan and Julia Potwin Morgan, who in the early 70's moved to Highland Park which in that day was real country, to bring up their growing family of children. Their home on North Sheridan Road was always a center of unflinching hospitality. Following his graduation from Cornell University, Mr. Anson Morgan entered the Chicago Varnish Company, founded by his father, and later became one of its executives. In November 1899, he married Miss Ella Clerihew of Minneapolis and for many years they made their home in Highland Park, where they both took part in all community activities, civic, school and church. Mr. Morgan was an elder in the Presbyterian church and a director and officer of the Highland Park State Bank. He was a member of the Exmoor Country Club and the Union League Club of Chicago.

All the friends of Anson Morgan, and they are many, remember his unflinching courtesy, his loyalty, and the qualities that distinguished him as a man of the highest ideals.

Mr. Morgan is survived by his widow and four children, A. Clerihew Morgan, of Atlanta, Ga.; Otho H. Morgan of Ithaca, N. Y.; Mrs. Hamilton Macomb of Memphis, Tenn.; and Judy Morgan of Atlanta, Georgia; one brother, Elisha Morgan of Vashen, Wash., and three sisters, Mrs. R. C. Day of St. Louis, Mo., Mrs. Tom Bellhouse of Alto, Ga., and Mrs. Francis S. North of Lake Forest Ill.

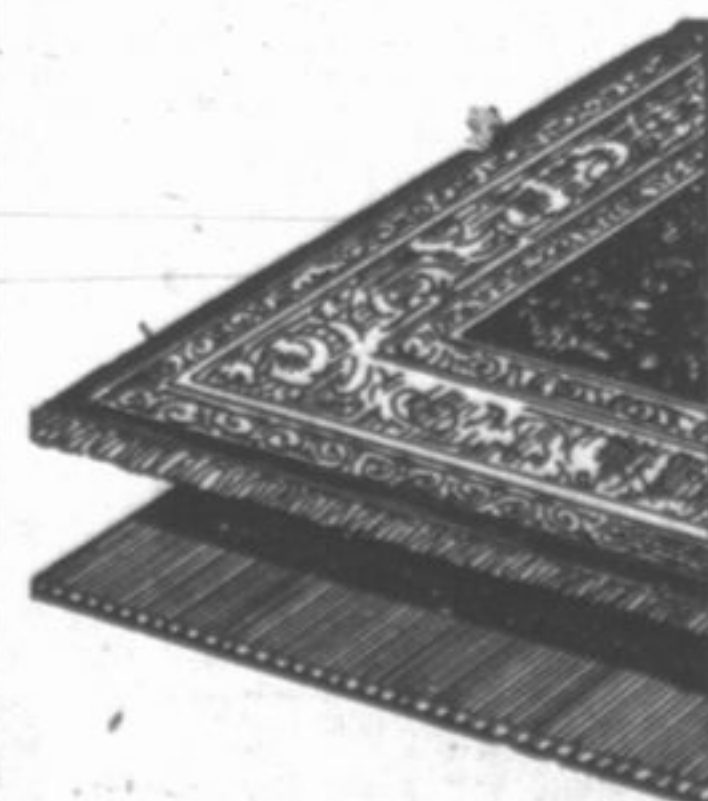
