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\$45,000 Goal Set For Third Annual Chest Campaign

The goal of the Third Annual Campaign of the Highland Park Community Chest, set for October 27th-November 12th, will remain the same as it was a year ago, \$45,-000, according to announcement made today by Lewis B. Sinclair, Chest Treasurer, following approval by the Board of Directors of the Budget Committee's recommenda-

cies and for Chest operations. "While there is no change in the total quota for the Chest campaign this year over last year," Mr. Sinclair stated, "there have been a number of changes in individual agency allocations, a few slight increases in some cases to meet greater operating costs, repair of buildings, etc, The increases to a number of the agencies, however, were offset by one reduced allocation due to the discontinuance of a special service, and the fact that this year no special contingency fund was included in the budget."

Last year the Board of Directors of the Chest voted a special allocatiion following the Chest campaign to the Highland Park Social Service, to administer in behalf of the American Legion Annual Christmas Party. This year the allocation for this special purpose has been included in the budget of Social Serv-

Final 1936-37 Allocation Paid

In connection with the announcement of this year's campaign budget, Treasurer Sinclair announced that final payment to agency members of the Chest of last year's allocation were being made this week, amounting to a total of \$3,025.00. Campaign Preparation Progresses

Jerome P. Bowes, General Campaign Chairman, stated Wednesday night that the sixteen district committees for this Fall's Campaign practically complete, and would be announced early next week.

He also announced the appointof the Campaign Publicity Committee, composed of James T. Aubrey, Gilbert Fuller, Walter Rubens, L. H. Selz, and Bruce Logie. "This committee has the publicity material for the campaign well underway", said Mr. Bowes, "and I feel that the volunteer workers in this year's campaign will have the way well paved for them through the efforts of this committee, by the time active solicitation gets underway."
