## D. A. R. BETTER FILMS REVIEW

"Slim." Cast, Pat O'Brien, Henry Fonda, Margaret Lindsay, Stuart Erwin. Thursday, Oct. 14. An unusual and absorbing story of the

powerhouse business. Dialogue is especially crisp and in character. Comedy relief supplied by Stuart Erwin is effective. The photography particularly that of the tower releasing static power when the insulators burn out during a blizzard is extremely effective. Family.

"Kid Galahad." Cast: Edward G. Robinson, Wayne Morris, Bette Davis, Humphrey Bogart. Friday and Saturday, Oct. 15-16. This prize fight drama is a man's picture. It follows rather closely the story by Francis Wallace. The entire cast is excellent. It is well directed with no whitewashing of the fight game. The contrast between the peaceful country life and the sordid atmosphere of the fight business is sharply drawn. Adults.

While not authentic history, this film presents a fascinating story of early New York and the life of our Jim Fish, who rose from obscurity to power.
