Paul Ziegner Found Dead In His Store Early Tuesday A.M.

Paul Ziegner, owner of the Central Hardware store, was found dead in his place of business, 611 Central ave., early Tuesday morning. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Ziegner went to his store as usual that morning, at 7:30 o'clock, and shortly before 8 o'clock he was found by a customer, seated at his desk, dead. He had been in ill health for several years.

Born in Germany, July 28, 1882, he was brought to this country by his parents, Ferdinand and Wilhelmina Ziegler, when six months old. The family settled in Galena, Illinois, later moving to Chicago and from there to Nashville, Oregon, returning again to Chicago. For the past twenty-seven years he has been a resident of Highland Park.

At the time of young manhood, Mr. Ziegner volunteered his services to our country to aid in the Spanish American difficulties. He was hindered, however, in being able to see much active service due to a siege of malaria fever with which he be-

came afflicted. Following his discharge, he was married to Miss Ellen Koch of Deerfield on March 18, 1911.

On September 14, 1914, Mr. Ziegner went to work for the Harder Hardware store, located on Central ave., where he remained until April 1927 when he opened a store for himself in the Goldberg building. He operated in this location until about five and one-half years ago, when his store was destroyed by fire. He then moved the store to a building in the rear of his residence where he successfully operated until the time of his death.

The deceased was a member of the Modern Woodmen and the Spanish American War Veterans, and had also been a member of the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce.

He is survived by his wife Ellen Koch Ziegner, four brothers, John and Carl, who live in Chicago, Martin and Edward of Seattle, Washington, and one sister, Mrs. Anne Curtis of Tacoma, Washington.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at 2 o'clock from the family home at 611 Central ave. Interment will be in Memorial Park cemetery.
