The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Willingness to become as a little child and to leave the old for the new, renders thought receptive of the advanced idea. Gladness to leave the false landmarks and joy to see them disappear,—this disposition helps to precipitate the ultimate harmony. The purification of sense and self is a proof of progress" (p. 323-4).

Historical Events To Feature Parade In Libertyville

Signing of the Constitution and all the color of the colonial era was chosen last week as the central idea for Libertyville's eighth annual Homecoming, October 23.

Many famous figures are expected to parade village streets. Betsy Ross, the Indians—both natural and Boston Tea Party style—will be seen bowing graciously from floats. That is the general idea, at least, that promoters of the 1937 Homecoming hope to see fulfilled, it was learned.

They will stress, between now and Homecoming, the patriotic theme note. Floats are to depict momentous events in the nation's history. Lincoln freeing the slaves, the fight for freedom of the press, and other milestones of progress will make the Homecoming parade, for this year more stirring in its unity than has been seen for many years.

Mr. Johnson said that more emphasis will be placed this year on quality of float design and construction rather than on quantity. Libertyville's annual Homecoming has become famous throughout northern Illinois for its color and spirit, he said, and it is expected this year's parade will be better than ever.
