An Astronomical Discovery Made By Former H. P. Youth

Our own James Cuffey, who is now on the staff of Harvard university, has been making some astronomical history. In a recent Science News Letter, (published at Washington, D.C.), Harvard Observatory officials announce that discovery has been made, by James Cuffey of the Observatory staff, of a new type of astronomical subsystem in the universe. The new system consists of a giant cluster of some hundreds of stars which revolves about a still larger cluster, much as the earth travels about the sun. Astronomers say it presents the first positive indication they have had that these tremendous clusters may be connected with one another by gravity to form independent sub-orders within the gal-

The discovery was the result of numerous extremely accurate computations of the distances from the sun, of nine galactic star clusters in the constellation Auriga, the most comprehensive and exact measurements of these distances ever made. The two clusters, the research showed to be companions, are those known as Messier 38, which has a mass about 500 times that of our sun, and NGC 1907, which is about 75 times the mass of our sun. The smaller one, it was found, revolves about the larger cluster with the Suggest Site On time required for one complete revolution estimated to be about 60,000,-000 years.

He became interested in the science of astronomy while very young, and some of his first successful telescopes, for which he ground his own lenses, were made while he was yet a student in Miss Guiney's astronomy class in Elm Place Grammar school.
