COMMUNITY CENTERS HERE AND THERE

As you probably know our community is interested in the possibilities of having a Community House. What briefly is a Community House? It is a building open under leadership, with an organized recreation program which attracts all people in the community; especially the non-school members of said community. The prime duty of the directors of this building is to provide self organized groups an opportunity for expression in the various types of activities that they want.

Last year 1,347 community houses were reported in 321 cities of the United States. Forty-eight cities during the past two years built community houses and auditoriums with PWA grants; and there were undoubtedly a number more built under private auspices.

Recent types and trends of community houses: Shawnee, Oklahoma, recently built a combination auditorium-gymnasium; it included also an assembly-social room, a kitchen, and several clubrooms for small group activities. Los Angeles has opened four of this type recently.

Highland Park, Michigan is now erecting a community center which will include a gymnasium, showers, lockers, two club-rooms and a recreation department office.

Lexington, Kentucky has rebuilt a beautiful old home and also has built to it an addition to house the auditorium and gymnasium facilities. Scranton, Pa., has a new field-house which in addition to the gymnasium and lockers includes several small club-rooms.

Fremont, Nebraska has a new community center which houses the city offices, committee rooms, dance floor, boxing and wrestling rooms and a gymnasium. A center in Oklahoma City includes a little theater of 410 seats.

Decatur, Illinois has increased its community centers from 5 to 17 in the past two years and Sioux City, Iowa, during the same period, has increased its centers from 9 to 24. Schools are used largely in the above two cities.

Therefore it can be seen that the Community House idea is rapidly spreading over the entire country.

Another thought is that facilities provided in these various community centers were not uniform. Each community has greater need for certain facilities and therefore provides for them.

Let us here in Highland Park think wisely as to what facilities ought to be provided in our proposed community house.

Many Improvements Being Made Here In Business Houses

Several of Highland Park's business houses are undergoing remodeling or redecorating programs. I. H. Nemeroff, jeweler, has installed new equipment to his optometry department and refurnished his entire store.

The Blue Goose Food Shop recently enlarged their display space.

During the past week the Consumers store has been redecorated, both interior and exterior, making it more attractive.

Today the National Tea company will be closed to undergo a revamping of their store in order to more efficiently handle the checking of groceries, and to be able to give better service to its customers.

The Jewel Tea company, which is

a new enterprise in Highland Park, is rapidly completing its quarters on Central avenue, for the opening date, which will be in the very near future.

Mr. Pearl has recently remodeled the interior of the Pearl theater building and rebuilt the canopy over the side walk with an attractive Neon sign, preparatory to the opening of the theater in a short time.

These and possibly numerous other improvements which have not come to our attention, are just some of the things which prove Highland Park to be a progressive city. Public demands in a rapid growing community tend to create a progressive spirit.

L. F. Bank Celebrates Its 30th Birthday

The First National Bank of Lake Forest celebrated its thirtieth birthday Sunday.

Organized on Oct. 31, 1907, the community's only bank has operated continuously, without corporate change, since that time. Starting with a capital of \$50,000 and deposits of less than \$100,000, the institution now reports capital, surplus, and reserves of more than \$500,000 and deposits of more than \$6,500,000.

Frank W. Read was the first cashier and managing officer of the Lake Forest bank. Today, as president, he is still its managing officer, assisted by P. H. Spidel, vice president; William Harding, cashier, and a force of 19 employees.
