# **Building Total** Climbs To \$225,076 **During Month, Here**

With permits for a \$120,000 apartment house and a \$58,000 school addition being issued, construction valuation in Highland Park for October rallied to hit \$225,076.

It was an appreciable gain over the September figure when 16 per mits were issued calling for only \$98,834 in building. In October 1936 the total was \$155,069.

A 29 per cent rise in construction valuation for the first 10 months of this year over the corresponding period in 1936 was reported. The accumulated value thus far in 1937 is \$1,763,030 compared with \$1,369,-312 a year ago.

Included among the 12 permits issued were those taken out by Esther Holznagel, 1 N. LaSalle street, Chicago, for an apartment and store building in Ravinia, and the board of education of District 108 for a \$57,850 addition to the Braeside school.
