Building Total Climbs To \$225,076 During Month, Here

With permits for a \$120,000 apartment house and a \$58,000 school addition being issued, construction valuation in Highland Park for October rallied to hit \$225,076.

It was an appreciable gain over the September figure when 16 permits were issued calling for only \$98,834 in building. In October 1936 the total was \$155,069.

A 29 per cent rise in construction valuation for the first 10 months of this year over the corresponding period in 1936 was reported. The accumulated value thus far in 1937 is \$1,763,030 compared with \$1,369,312 a year ago.

Included among the 12 permits issued were those taken out by Esther Holznaegel, 1 N. LaSalle street, Chicago, for an apartment and store building in Ravinia, and the board of education of District 108 for a \$57,850 addition to the Braeside school.

Permits for three single-family dwellings were issued, the Highland

Park building department announced. The largest residence planned is that of Maurice Pollak to be erected at 6105 Bronson lane at an estimated cost of \$20,390.

No Real Damage Over Hallowe'en

Hallowe'en, in Highland Park this year, was apparently unusually quiet. Chief Moroney added twenty men to his regular staff of seventeen men to maintain peace and quiet and avoid destruction by the mischievous youths.

Chief De Smidt of Highwood increased his staff for the eventful evening, but could report only a minimum of damage over the week-end.

Deerfield Observes Annual American Education Week

Deerfield Post No. 738, The American Legion, is emphasizing the observance of the sixteenth annual American Education Week, Nov. 7 to 13. This occasion, which is sponsored by the National Education Association, The American Legion, The United States Office of Education, and other national organizations, has a two-fold purpose: it directs attention to the schools throughout the Nation, and it re-emphasizes the vital relationship of education to democracy.

In 1936, nearly 7,000,000 citizens visited their schools during this celebration. Scores of others were reached through the press, radio, and motion picture, creating a bond of interest and cooperation between citizens and public schools.

In calling attention to this observance, the Legion recalls the words of Washington: "The best means of forming a manly, virtuous and happy people will be found in the right education of youth. Without this foundation every other means, in my opinion, must fail." The National Legionnaire summarizes: "There is nothing more important to the American people than the safeguarding of their future as a free democratic people. And there

is no agency whose work is more fundamental in this task than the public school. It is most fitting, therefore, that American Education Week should be set aside each year as a time for rededication of the schools to the service of democracy." The services at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and in the Amphitheatre at Arlington National Cemetery, Armistice Day, Thursday, Nov. 11, will be broadcast over a national hook-up by the National Broadcasting Company, from 12:00 o'clock to 1:00 p.m. (EST).
