120 Attend Dry Youth Rally at Bethany Church

The Lake County Youth Dinner Rally held on last Thursday evening in the Bethany Evangelical church, Highland Park, is regarded as one of the most successful dry rallies in some years. There was an attendance of about 125. There were 38 present from Cook county. Delegations were there from Waukegan, Libertyville, Deerfield and Grant township. The promoters regarded the spirit of the gathering as very encouraging.

The central features of the program were two-minute responses by young people from different groups on "Youth and the Liquor Problem." Those making responses were:

Mrs. Harriet L. McBride of River Forest, member of the State Youth Auxiliary Committee, spoke on "Youth and Our Party." Mrs. Leona Thomas of Waukegan, president of the Lake County W.C.T.U., gave a rapid-fire talk.

The guest speaker was Rev. Lester R. Minion, pastor of the River Forest M. E. church, who delivered an inspirational address in which he urged young people to live romantically and get a real thrill out of life by espousing a worth-while cause. He pointed out that the great examples of all time and those who have led humanity through the ages were those who had done this. It is one of the finest addresses that

has been delivered in this section in some time.

The toastmistress was Lois Gilbert Krandell, national chairman of the Youth Auxiliary. She was introduced by Rev. H. F. Siemsen, pastor of the host church. Community singing was led by Roland Simpson of Chicago. Splendid music was furnished by the Olsen Orchestra of the United Evangelical church. Devotionals were led by Rev. G. W. Garber, pastor of the Libertyville Presbyterian church, and Rev. Earl J. Bruso, pastor of the Bethlehem Evangelical church of Deerfield. Leo F. Jeannene, state chairman of the Illinois Prohibition committee, spoke briefly of the progress of the youth effort in Illinois.

One result of this rally will probably be the organization of a Youth Temperance Group in Highland Park. It is expected that a dinner rally of this series will be held in Waukegan sometime during the Rogers Park Presbyterian church, Chicago, on Friday evening, November 5.

Former Highwood Minister Killed in Fall, Saturday

The Rev. G. A. O. Engstrom, former pastor of the Zion Lutheran Church of Highwood, and for the past three years pastor of St. John's Evangelical Lutheran church, 3052 N. Spaulding ave., Chicago, died suddenly Saturday morning following a fall from the back porch of the church.

The Rev. Mr. Engstrom, who was 67 years of age, had been doing some work at the church, and was leaning against the rail of the back porch when it gave way, felling him

five feet to the ground. The accident at first was not considered serious, but a few minutes after he had picked himself up from the fall he collapsed and died.

The deceased was a pastor in Highwood for eleven years, and during his pastorate here, he made a host of friends. The sympathy of the community is extended his wife, Josephine who with a brother Carl are the only survivors.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock from Immanuel Lutheran church, Chicago, the Rev. Dr. Peter Peterson, officiating. Interment was in Montrose cemetery.
