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Report Chest Campaign 72% Complete In Two Weeks Drive

No finer display of volunteer civic effort and community response has ever been manifested in Highland Park, as that of the Highland Park Community Chest Drive which in two short weeks' time has put the Campaign within striking distance of its goal.

At the third report meeting of District chairmen at Chest headquarters Tuesday night, the general campaign total was reported 72% complete.

Conscientious effort on the part of the workers and generous response of those who have given, gave evidence that the campaign could be completed 100 per cent by the close of the campaign, November 12th. Workers have reported that with few exceptions Highland Park residents are cheerfully and promptly renewing their support of the twelve welfare agencies represented by the Chest.

Many newcomers to Highland Park, within recent months are showing sincere interest in the Campaign and have been anxious to become a part of this worthy Community enterprise.

Campaign chairman, Jerome P. Bowes, Jr., following Tuesday night's report meeting, announced the campaign total at \$37,526 and expressed the belief that with the same concentrated effort of workers and generous response of givers shown to date, that the goal of \$45,000 would be reached by the end of this week.

County Population Gain 20% in 20 Years

With an increase in population of 70.2 per cent in the past 20 years, Lake county is second to DuPage in the population growth in the fourties in the Chicagoland area. The total population of the five counties that are the heart of the Chicago district, Cook, Lake, DuPage, Will and Kane, is now 4,782,000. Forecasts put the figure at 4,941,000 in 1940.

The gain in DuPage county over the past two decades is 185.8 per cent. Cook county shows an increase of 54.2 per cent, and the city of Chicago, 44.7 per cent. Kane county's growth is set at 40.5 per cent, and Will county's, 34.5 per cent.

The 1940 population of Lake county, based on the anticipated increase of the next three years, will be 118,000. In 1917, there were 69,833 persons residing in the county.

"To Every Worker": "If you are unemployed or partly unemployed and are able to work and are seeking work, please fill out this report card right away and mail it before midnight, Saturday, Nov. 20, 1937. No postage is needed." "The Congress directed me to take this census. It is important to the unemployed and to everyone in this land that the census be complete, honest and accurate. If you give me the facts, I shall try to use them for the benefit of all who need and want work and do not now have it. Franklin D. Roosevelt."

Next Tuesday, employees of the Highland Park post office will distribute to every worker in the community an unemployment report card, which is to be carefully filled out and mailed before midnight November 20, 1937. No postage stamp will be necessary. All questions on the card must be answered truthfully, and accurately, and any one who is in doubt as to how to correctly fill out the card, may secure help or information at the local post office. It is essential that every unemployed or partly unemployed person in this country fill out a blank, so that the government will know definitely just how many of our people are out of work.
