Prospects for a successful season were considerably brightened by Tuesday afternoon's showing against Warren High of Gurnee in a practice game at the Warner gym. The varsity turned in a 29-11 victory paced by a flashy young forward, Fulvio Fabbri, who graduated from the sophomore team last year.

The Frosh-soph team won their game handily 20-10 with Fritz Bernardi scoring most of the buckets. Bernardi is a veteran from last year's team as is Tom Summers, who played center. Lovie Picchetti, Louis Wodlinger, Alan Gerken, Rocky and Tony Vole and Eldo Casali were other promising performers.

The elimination of the center jump except at the beginning of each half will make basketball a speedier game than ever this year. Coaches Lauer and Hamill will rely on speed to bring them victory in the games with Leyden next Wednesday.

Norman Ross Will Interview Women At Store Opening

Highland Park will be offered an opportunity to both witness and "go on the air" next week when Norman Ross, ace news commentator and announcer, stages the radio program "The Woman in the Store" from the new Jewel Food Store, 519 Central avenue, on Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning over WGN at 11 a.m. to 11:15 a.m. Every woman interviewed by Mr. Ross, during the three programs, will be given free a thick juicy Wilson's Tender Made Ham Steak with the compliments of Wilson & Co., who sponsor the program.

Rated one of radio's greatest personalities Ross is credited with having originated seven years ago the currently popular "question and answer" interview type radio program. Ross has appeared in many programs coast-to-coast both as a master of ceremonies and as a sports commentator.

Born in Portland, Oregon, he attended California's Stanford university taking a prominent part on its swimming teams. H. L. Williamson Is New State Press Association Head

H. L. Williamson, publisher of the Printing Industry and National Printing Journalist, Springfield, and secretary of the Illinois Press association for the past 22 years, was unanimously elected president of the association for 1937-38 at the closing sessions of the 72nd annual convention and journalism conference in Champaign, and Urbana, Saturday, October 30.

Other officers elected are as follows: Don B. Pauschert, Pana Weekly News, first vice president; G. C. Terry, Tri-County Press, Polo, second vice president; Byron K. Le Crone, Effingham Daily Record and Weekly Democrat, third vice president, and Arthur M. Morgan, Rantoul Press and Chanut Field News, treasurer. Curtis G. Small, Harrisburg Daily Register, was named temporary secretary by the executive committee. A permanent secretary will be appointed within the near future or as soon as satisfactory arrangements can be worked out with the University of Illinois for the office to be operated in conjunction with the College of Journalism.

Mr. Williamson, who was first elected secretary of the Illinois Press association in 1915, has seen the membership grow from 36 when he took office to 712 when he retired as secretary. At the spring meeting in Chicago last May when Mr. Williamson announced his resignation to take effect at the annual meeting this fall, members of the association presented him with a gold watch in recognition of his 22 years of service to the organization. The Illinois Press association is now the oldest and the largest state press association in the United States, having been founded in 1865.

Mr. Williamson is the publisher of The Printing Industry, a controlled circulation publication for the graphic arts and allied trades, with a distribution of 60,000 copies monthly; in addition he also publishes National Printer Journalist, the oldest trade journal for newspaper publishers and printers in the United States, having been founded in 1882 by Father Herbert, who first formed the National Editorial association at about the same time.

In his secretary's report for the past year, Mr. Williamson proposed a Gold Star Membership Plan for members of the Illinois Press association who pay dues annually and attend all conventions of the organization for a five-year period.
